WELCOME AND CALL TO ORDER

Elizabeth Delaney and students from Albuera Street Primary welcomed delegates and acknowledged the traditional owners of the land.

Jenny Branch, President of Tasmanian State School Parents and Friends opened Conference at 9.07 am

TASMANIAN SCHOOLS PARENTS COALITION

The Tasmanian School Parents Coalition is a newly established group with representatives from the Tasmanian Catholic School Parents and Friends Federation and the Australian Parents Council.

The Memorandum of Understanding recognises important areas of education where parents representing all education sectors can work together to improve educational outcomes for all children.

Jenny Branch introduced representatives from the Catholic and Independent parents associations, Ian Dalton and Bill Button and all three signed a Memorandum of Understanding on behalf of their organisations outlining the Terms of Reference and operation of the Coalition.

OFFICIAL OPENING ADDRESS

Jenny Branch introduced the Premier and Minister for Education, the Honourable David Bartlett.

The Premier acknowledged the members of the Albuera Street Primary, the Hon Sue Napier, MP and the commitment Jenny Branch has made to education and the organisation during her time as President.

He also acknowledged Jenny Grossmith as incoming President and the work done by the organisation on behalf of students.

Premier Bartlett put forward why he believes education is so important and the opportunities within reach for Tasmania.

Tasmania stands at the intersection of global imperatives for the future of education. High speed broadband will have huge impacts on how we deliver education in the State and will make Tasmania the most connected place on the Planet. But we must continue to improve the way we deliver education

The Premier is committed to lifting literacy rates to the highest level by 2016 – an achievable timeline. Launch into Learning is having a great impact on the readiness for school of children. Family and Child centres will provide all services that young families need and will build on the work Launch into Learning has already done.

Graphical representation of the Strategic Plan was available for delegates.

We must talk widely and loudly for the benefits of parental involvement in the education of their children.

ADDRESS BY MIKE BRAKEY, CEO, TASMANIAN ACADEMY

Mike gave some background to his experience and how his experience led him to this position.

Mike spent his teaching years on the North-West coast of Tasmania and has been excited by the opportunities offered by the Tasmanian Academy – a fledgling Organisation still finding their feet.

After 10 years at Hellyer College students come from Circular Head, West Coast, King Island and the rural hinterland behind Burnie. As principal at Hellyer Mike felt like he was fighting with one hand behind his back. The opportunities were limited for students, working in sub-standard facilities with no access to better facilities over the road in the TAFE campus. There were limitations for VET students doing certificate courses in the college system with the ability to work at a higher level.

With low retention rates compared with the Mainland States there were a number of opportunities but the decision to transform the senior secondary sector has been enormous.

As a Principal, decisions were made autonomously by the principal and meant that all colleges operated differently. There were difficulties getting resources into rural areas and difficulty coordinating educational opportunities equitably across all areas.

As a statutory authority, the Tasmanian Academy has a high level of accountability. The pathways do have some crossovers but there is now the opportunity to get the best of both worlds

Mike is seeing information from teachers on student achievement. The September Board meeting of the Academy will see a plan for formal contact with parents and a forum on campus for parents.

In term 2 there is an exam period and that will be followed by parent/teacher interviews and a forum and in third term a parent forum. Parents can expect calls from teachers in the Academy if there are issues about attendance and achievement.

Mike went through a PowerPoint presentation outlining the Goals of the Academy. They aim to have 80% achieve TCE and for that to grow to 90%. They are aware that they need to be able to respond to local communities

ADDRESS BY BELINDA McLENNAN, CEO, TASMANIAN POLYTECHNIC

The Polytechnic is a new concept and Belinda explained how it works.

Lots of students learn best in a different setting than that being offered in the past.

Academic learning and applied learning meet different learning needs of students.

Applied learning and vocational aspirations must be considered as well as cultural change challenges and new experiences in new environments.

The Polytechnic is identifying challenges with teaching workforce but is attracting young teachers into the new learning environment.

Teacher registration will need to reflect different methods and the Polytechnic is working with the Teachers Registration Board on this.

The Polytechnic is more diverse than the Academy because of the cohort entering the Polytechnic. The aim is to lift the level of qualification and achievement for grade 11 and 12 equivalent students. The majority of enrolments are older students who would previously have been in TAFE.

The Polytechnic will be responsible for overseeing Trade Training Centres funded by the Commonwealth. There is a strong focus on the workforce of the future. Students have access to a development and learning plan and involvement in an enrichment program.

DISCUSSION RE TASMANIAN ACADEMY AND POLYTECHNIC

How will the doors be open to rural and remote students who have to leave home to continue with post year 10 education?

There is an underlying belief in the Academy that if students can stay at home to complete years 11 and 12 then that is the best option. It is therefore a requirement to build up the year 11 curriculum to encourage students to continue their studies.

Rural Campus cannot have the broad number of subjects available, so it is better to have the best quality of subject offerings.

What supports will be in place for students and parents?

It is pleasing to see improvements in student accommodation for students living away from home where they can have improved access to a broader range of subjects. There are also other options currently being considered. Where students are living away from home there needs to be a link with the home community.

What happened to the study done on the 2001 Year 10 cohort?

2001 Year 10 Student Outcomes data is still being used and the data confirmed how poor the retention rates were in rural communities.

Timetabling at Polytechnic:

Who is making sure students are receiving the flexibility of delivery and the support and monitoring talked about in the Polytechnic?

Who is following up on poor mid-year results and truancy that is deemed “acceptable”

The Polytechnic are working towards making that work better in the near future.

Issue was how to put timetables together on college campuses. Result was maximised choice but disjointed timetabling.

Need to look at what is the learning experience. This may be more than just attending class, but also external experiences and places.

Timetables are hoped to be more streamlined in 2010, but also have to fit with student transport.

Mike Brakey has also sought feedback on students attending year 11 at the Academy in 2009.

Education has been turned on its head. Is this policy going to be accepted and continued by any changes in State Government, or will future Governments introduce a new “way forward” of their own?

Hon Sue Napier: Other States in Australia are looking at what has been done in Tasmania. All round the world the same issues are evident. Education must recognise multiple working styles.

There is a limited time to demonstrate that this is working for Tasmanian students and teachers are having the most difficulty with the change.

Great teachers have a huge influence on students. There are teachers opting to take early retirement rather than go down the road of change.

There has been huge positive influence of some very fine and experienced staff in Senior Secondary colleges. Parents have experienced and observed the negative impacts on staff of the change to Tasmania Tomorrow.

What is being done in the Academy and Polytechnic to ensure good quality staff are retained?

The impact on teachers is high on the priority list. Leadership in the Academy has been focused on teachers. The depth of the difficulty in getting teachers to engage in the changes was acknowledged. There will be continued provision of professional support and professional learning for teachers, who are critical to the success of the change.

There is a perceived additional challenge in the Polytechnic as it is bringing together people with very different past experience. They are bound up in bringing together the best of what was there before. Acknowledge that some are feeling disempowered.

In his opening speech, the Premier acknowledged the importance of parental input to children’s education at all levels. Whilst the forms at the Academy campus sound excellent and stakeholder meetings provide opportunities at the Polytechnic, how do these organisations intend providing an opportunity to seek collective support and lobby for issues? (The current bus issue for 19 year old grade 12 students is a good case in point)

The Boards are responsible for representing the issues affecting students on campuses.

Is there a danger in discriminating between academic and applied learning?

Subjects have that focus but students need to learn how their knowledge can be used in the wider community with a greater understanding of how that works in the workplace. (Refer David Kolb, “Experiential Learning”).

Please explain the phased transitioning with Regional High Schools – What does it mean?

The process of transitioning with rural schools is important and staff are working together with the schools.

What supports and links do/will be offered to students and their families, who have to leave home to attend larger Polytechnic campuses.

Support systems for students who have to leave home will be provided in conjunction with the Academy. The aim is to give rural students local options, but not all options can be available in all regions.

The Polytechnic is currently confirming people in leadership roles and have appointed a person to the position responsible for liaising with rural high schools.

Vision of polytechnic is not the reality on the ground. Who is responsible for communicating with parents?

The student coordinator on each campus is responsible for support and reporting to parents. The model is not fully in place at the moment.

ADDRESS BY PROFESSOR IAN HAY, DEAN OF EDUCATION, UTAS

Three movements are occurring in education in Tasmania.

We are now going down the road of National testing, resulting in issues about naming and shaming, but there are benefits in comparing like areas around the country.

Students in Tasmania are very good problem solvers.

National Curriculum – Tasmania is well represented.

National Teacher Accreditation – need portability for teachers to meet demand in a variety of locations.

The collapse of private child care (ABC Learning) demonstrated that deregulation had gone too far. Early childhood education and K-8 is now being much more aligned.

Early Years Framework. When looking at closing the gap and raising the bar it must be remembered that a lot of the problems arise before children enter school. In 0-8 a lot is focussed on play based learning.

SES is not always the critical factor in whether a child is ready for school. Social skills developed at age 4 are the same skills that will affect an 18 year old and into adulthood.

Education is an investment not an expenditure.

Changes to the early childhood program and teacher training. Teacher training is much more of a competency based program. Are looking at primary teaching first, early childhood specialisation, and a range of other specialist teaching areas.

Language of Instruction. Dialogue with children is important. Children need to understand the words and meanings used in teaching. Need to personalise learning.

Working with parents in a low socio economic area. Kids go through a silent period when they are placed in a new environment. There is no such thing as a bad text for learning to read.

Greater emphasis in the new syllabus on phonics, alphabet and word recognition.

Greater focus on retelling – engaging and retelling is a lifelong process of learning.

Parents are the first teachers and the role of parents changes over time. Teacher and parent are in partnership.

NAPLAN is a very narrow way of testing.

National Curriculum will allow stakeholders to have a voice. Competency based learning is closely linked to problem solving

Tasmania is hopeful of getting TER to 85% -

Will the base score for teachers going into Uni be changed?

Students coming from year 12 into primary teaching have a high TER. Others come in from a previous degree and mature age learners are coming in from a variety of backgrounds without year 12 education and tend to make excellent teachers.

Priority is to have teachers who can deal with kids and a greater emotional intelligence

That this conference calls on the Honourable David Bartlett MHA, Minister of Education and the media to embrace responsible reporting of performance data and cease the practice of irresponsible comparisons of school performance data, remembering that children are the ones most affected by the publication of simplistic league tables.

Both parents have the right to access information.

TASMANIAN STATE SCHOOL PARENTS AND FRIENDS INC

BY-LAWS

1. THE MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

- (a) Duty Statements shall be provided for all officers and employees of TASSP&F, reviewable annually by the Management Committee.
- (b) Notice of items for inclusion in the Agenda of a meeting of the Management Committee shall be forwarded to reach the Executive Officer at least fourteen (14) days before the date of each meeting.
- (c) The Executive Officer shall forward to each member of the Management Committee an agenda paper containing matters to be dealt with at that meeting together with copies of reports to be presented at that meeting.
- (d) No matter shall be dealt with at a Management Committee Meeting unless notice has been given in accordance with the By-Laws provided that the Management Committee may deal with any matters without notice if in the opinion of the majority of delegates present the matter is of an urgent nature.
- (e) No record of the proceedings of any Management Committee Meeting shall be made by any person other than a member of the Management Committee. Only the appropriate person shall relay information and decisions of the Management Committee.
- (f) The Management Committee shall be authorised to pay honorariums to the President.

2. REGIONS

- (a) The regions of the Association shall be the North, the North-West and the South.
- (b) Regional Coordinators shall be responsible for the convening of regional meetings at least once each term.
- (c) Regional operating costs will be funded from TASSP&F budget as authorised by the Management Committee
- (d) All member schools within each region shall be notified of regional meetings.

3. CONFERENCES

- (a) Written notice of each conference shall be forwarded to each Member Association, Life Member and Management Committee member provided that accidental omission to give notice shall not invalidate the Conference.

- (b) Notices of Motion to be dealt with by Annual Conference must be lodged with the Executive Officer by the last day of First Term.
- (c) Notices of Motion may be submitted to an Annual Conference by a Member Association, Life Member or the TASSP&F Management Committee.
- (d) An agenda paper containing all motions, list of nominated candidates, and other matters to be dealt with at the Conference shall be forwarded to each Member Association, Life Member and Management Committee Member not later than forty-five (45) days prior to Annual Conference, or thirty (30) days prior to a Special Conference, .
- (e) Annual Conference Notices of Motion shall be presented to the Management Committee who shall have the power to return any notice of motion to the sender with the advice that it requires alteration, deletion or addition before it can be accepted as a Conference item.
- (f) Proxy votes shall be given to an attending delegate or the TASSP&F Secretary.
- (g) The Management Committee is to maintain a Policy Document-

4. CERTIFICATES OF APPRECIATION

The Management Committee shall have the power to present Certificates of Appreciation for outstanding service.

5. ELECTION OF OFFICE BEARERS

- (a) Nomination forms shall be forwarded to all affiliated school associations at the same time that they are invited to submit agenda items for Conference.
- (b) All candidates shall submit, together with their nomination form, a resume of relevant experience for the respective position.
- (c) Candidates nominating for President shall have served a minimum of one year on the State Committee and shall have attended a minimum of five Management Committee meetings in the twelve months prior to nominating.

6. ELECTION OF REGIONAL DELEGATES

- (a) All affiliated school associations and parent groups will be entitled to nominate a member of their association or committee to be a regional delegate.
- (b) The term of appointment will be for one year, commencing from the rise of conference. Existing delegates will be entitled to re-nominate.

REPORTS FROM

MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The phrase *Parents & Friends* has many meanings, but it has truly reflected the coming together of like-minded people to work towards a better education for children. They usually have a child or family they are connected to and want to ensure they have a voice in the school these children are attending. Over time, many groups and committees have been formed within schools to provide opportunities for people to get involved. You could be a member of the school association in your school now or be part of the important sub-committees that provide a wider choice of ways for people to be active and have a voice. Regardless of how you get involved, we know by being involved you are improving the outcomes that the school delivers for its students.

This year our Organisation is again putting a name change up for you to consider. Changing the name will not take away from what we do or who we are, but the change is intended to align us with the Education Act, which refers only to school associations. Over time the organisation has come under criticism for not seeming to have a clear link to school associations through its name (though it cannot be argued that it hasn't made a clear link through the work it delivers). With the combination of a name change and the recognition of our work a clear link can be made between the two.

We see the Education Department more and more consulting directly with school community through that school's local school association. We also wish to ensure a collective voice is heard through our organisation when bigger, statewide issues are debated. Some schools are looking at how a federation may support their school. This is something I believe will need further unpacking and schools will need support to make sure this is the right decision for them. Tasmanian State School Parents & Friends will ensure parents are well informed to make these choices on behalf of their school.

Tasmanian State School Parents and Friends is the overarching body that can remain independent. A strong and independent voice may be needed to act on bigger issues that relate to all schools, not just an individual one – and a strong voice is certainly needed when difficult issues arise at the local level.

Consultation is a strange and sometimes uncontrollable beast, one that can have little positive impact if it is not genuine and directed towards an outcome. Too often we are consulted for the sake of a tick in a box and not for the expert opinions we as an organisation have to offer.

It is true that the membership of the state body has been varied over the last few years, with now just over half of the Tasmanian Government schools affiliated. We are presently conducting a review to identify areas which our members see need attention or where we could service them better. We must reverse the decline in membership and renew the importance of a collective voice for parents. We must also look at who sits around the table at the State level, especially if we are to represent from 0 – post-year 10. We may need to broaden our membership to other than the parents we have at present. We should ask questions: do we need a community member; will we represent the 0-4s with someone from the early years program; should we have a business person around the table and so on.

With the national agenda more than ever impacting on how our state schools operate, it is more important than ever that we have a strong voice. We have the development of a

National Curriculum and a new funding model. This model has three elements: it directs money to the states; the states then determine how to allocate it and the states report back to the Federal government on an outputs basis.

We must ensure that those funds are directed to programs that improve our students' learning and give them the best opportunities possible.

We can just look around the numbers at this year's annual conference to see we need to engage more with our members if we are to be representative of the parents and students of government schools in this State. The struggle to encourage people to be involved grows harder over time and this is a problem not unique to us. The National body representing parents (ACSSO) is also struggling and finding it harder to keep afloat in difficult financial times. Some parent organisations in the States and Territories are struggling financially and also finding it harder to find parents with the time or the interest in parent organisations.

I believe we need to respect the ever-growing demands on parents. I hope our review will give us other ways to offer representation that parents value and feel they need. We are moving into a new era of the parent voice and I will follow this with much interest as it evolves.

My time as President has meant many hours of work and has taken me away from my family so I could reach our members and other stakeholders who have needed support or help. It has been a demanding role, tough at times but I always keep my eye on the goal: trying to get the best for children at Tasmanian government schools. Those most vulnerable and not able to speak for themselves need and deserve a strong voice. I want to thank all those who helped me to achieve this during my time as President.

I value and appreciate all the mums, dads, children, nans, pops and everyone else I have met and spent time with – it was your input and kindness that allowed me to do my job.

NORTHERN COORDINATOR

The Northern region has been a little short of Committee Members this year but Sally Mitchell, Libby Bailey and myself have managed to represent the parent interests in the region in what has been a very challenging , exciting and diverse year for Education.

I would firstly to acknowledge Libby as this is her last year of what has been a very long and dedicated contribution to representing and supporting parents, children and education in Tasmania. Libby was recognised with Life Membership 2 years ago and has continued to contribute since then but has now decided to bow out on a wonderful many years of service. On behalf of us all and especially the Northern region I wish Libby all the very best of times as she enjoys her grand-daughter. We will miss you.

This year we have changed the regional meeting arrangements and have held meetings at 3 different schools instead of the one per term at the Adult Education rooms.

We met firstly at Summerdale Primary and then Lindie Read joined me for a wonderful meeting at St Marys and the opportunity to share with the school community in what is a fantastic District High School. More recently we had a meeting at Hagley Farm Primary School. Thank you to those schools for hosting these meetings.

This has been an interesting challenge and one that we will continue in term 3 and then be reviewed for 2010. It is an ongoing challenge with parents lives being so busy, to decide what may meet their needs best.

During the year I have also been privileged to be invited as a guest to several schools' Parents and Friends and Association meetings. I have been heartened and enriched by the wonderful things that are happening in our school communities and thank those schools for the opportunity to share their vision.

This year I have had regular meetings with Liz Banks, Manager, Learning Services North which has enabled both of us to keep up to date with happenings in Northern Schools. I have valued this time spent with Liz and the openness and care she has shown in dealing with sometimes sensitive issues raised by parents. Together we have been able to enhance the communications and problem solving resources to move forward for several schools and families.

This year for the first time there has been no Parent Voice on Campus at what was formally Newstead College. Launceston College Association remains until 2011. With the joint Academy and Polytechnic on a shared campus at Newstead I would like to acknowledge the senior staff of both entities in keeping open the lines of communication with me when I have needed to discuss issues. Hopefully by the 2010 school year a format for parent representation will have been made for this area of our student population.

It was with enormous pleasure that I recently attended the opening of the wonderful new accommodation unit situated on campus at Newstead but also available to out of town students from Launceston College. For many years the standard and availability of suitable supervised accommodation for rural students has been lacking and after much lobbying by the Isolated Children's Parents Association and the College Associations we now see a fantastic

facility. It provides unit accommodation for 50 students in self contained 4/5 room units. There is supervision out of class hours and for the first time students who may be unwell can remain in their units during the day. This will give much comfort to rural parents.

The Northern region has not had as many challenges with proposed closures and amalgamations as the rest of the state. There are some which were already down the road to change before the more public discussion happened after the Federal Capital Works funding announcements. These are now finalized or are continuing along the planned paths.

It is going to be fantastic to visit the revamped schools in the next couple of years and see how the improvements have enriched the learning environments of our children. I am particularly pleased for some of the rural schools who have not had significant modernization for many years and the feeling of pride in their surroundings is already evident in some schools.

In addition to the activities in the Northern region I have had a full year representing Tasmanian State Schools Parents and Friends on a number of committees and groups.

I was part of the working party that compiled the new Professional Learning Days Policy and felt instrumental in securing as part of the policy the requirement for school communities to agree to the Professional Learning days by a survey process and also that schools must work with parents, bus contractors and other schools in the area in the selecting of the days. Schools also must make options available for supervision of any children who parents cannot keep at home. It has been a very positive initiative by some schools to invite parents into the Professional Learning Days and to provide via newsletters reports of how the days are enhancing the school's delivery at a student level.

In addition I have been proud to be involved on the Drug Education in Schools group which actually wound up at the end of June when Federal Funding Models changed but has provided many schools with funding to run programs delivering to students from infant to year 12 some great resilience messages. This group represented not only State Schools but also Catholic and Independent Schools, as well as many agencies in the field of Youth Health, Alcohol and Drug Education and support. It was with great pride that during this time a very comprehensive Memorandum of Understanding was signed by all school and agency groups, Department of Education and Tasmanian Police on how to deal with drugs of all kinds should incidences arise in schools. This document is available on the DoE website. Bruce Mansfield has headed this group and I would like to thank him for his tireless work during the duration of the project and hope that when the new funding initiatives are announced the work will continue.

Mental Health In Schools has also, through the many agencies represented on the committee, been very active in schools statewide and continue to provide a conduit for communication about issues and programs related to providing children and youth with supportive Mental Health support and education.

Move Well Eat Well have now begun wonderful programs in many schools and their reports compiled by Coordinator Sue Moir have been regularly in *Parent Contact* and they are represented at Conference. The Move Well Eat Well Programs will be shining lights as time goes by in our primary schools.

It has been a privilege to share in meetings in the areas surrounding groups and discussions of our children with Special Needs. As always, funding issues and support in this area is very important and an ongoing challenge. I look forward to results of recent discussions moving funding forward.

Finally I cannot finish this report without mentioning the single thing that has taken up the most discussion time with parents and caused the most angst. It is of course bus fares. For those parents affected by the Core Passenger Review the paying of fares and particularly in urban fringe areas and by year 12 students who have turned 18, it has been a very long debate. It was so wonderful when wonderful Parent Power at Hagley Farm Primary School was finally heard and they have been recognized as being justified in holding out in their case of the unfairness of being required to pay to attend their local school. My congratulations to Kara and Michael and fellow parents. Several areas remain unresolved in particular Legana and the Senior Secondary issue. I am hopeful this will be resolved in the very near future.

NORTH WEST COORDINATOR

It has been another busy year on the North West and when I look back at the events, meetings and committees we have been to, some weeks there has barely been time to scratch yourself when you put your everyday life into the mix.

Closures and amalgamations have become hot items this year with a number of schools across the State being involved in this process.

One of the bigger issues for us has been our ongoing involvement with Waratah Primary School and the possibility of their closure. Many of the issues became news in our local media numerous times this year.

We also had the opportunity to attend a Parent and Friends meeting at Mountain Heights school. They have a dedicated parent group, who are very involved with their school and it was interesting finding out some of the issues that affect them being in an isolated area. Talked about their fund-raising events that have been held so far this year.

We also held a regional meeting at Ulverstone Primary School.

One of the biggest announcements made this year was the Building Revolution and as chairperson of Ulverstone Primary School Association, I attended the state-wide meeting in Launceston with our principal. We certainly came away buzzing with excitement and ideas on how we could use the funding.

I attended the Schools First Funding information session run by the National Australia Bank. The program is based on bringing together school and community members to improve student outcomes. There are two categories of awards that schools can apply for – *Impact Award* and *Seed Funding Award*.

Lindie Read and I also attended the TASCROSS funding workshop in Launceston. The Vincent Fairfax Family Foundation, Myer Foundation and Foundation for Rural and Regional Renewal all gave presentations on their organisations.

I met with Sam Van der Meulen from Anglicare who provided information about the PASS Program (Placement and Support Service). This is a statewide accommodation service for young people aged between 13-18 who are homeless or at risk of becoming homeless. They are seeking volunteers who can accommodate school students in that age group. The program is short term and volunteers can be single, couples or families. I was amazed that there are approximately 200 young people in the Devonport/ Ulverstone area who are homeless or at risk of becoming homeless.

Lindie Read and I attended information sessions on the new Child and Family Centres including a workshop with Dr Margy Wally, Director of Pen Green Centre in the UK. She talked about this Centre and the process involved in setting up, and engaging the community in the process. A wide range of stakeholders attended both forums.

One of the biggest highlights for me in the past year was attending the ACSSO Conference in Brisbane. It was the first time I had attended ACSSO Conference and it was a great

opportunity to meet and mix with parents from other States who are passionate about education and the direction in which it is heading.

Jenny Grossmith and I have also been attending the Local Community Partnership Advisory Panel, which is made up of local stakeholders from a range of sectors all interested in student education, opportunities and outcomes from grade 9 and up.

We have also met with North West Learning Services General Manager, Malcolm Wells on a range of issues.

North West delegates took on a project this year to create a guide for parents on school associations and parent groups. This is still a 'work in progress' but we expect to have it ready for release in the near future.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank Jenny Grossmith and Lindie Read for all their support this year on the N-W and Di Ellson who keeps our office in order and us on task with a gentle prod every now and then.

Well done to the rest of our TASSP&F team for all their hard work this past year, it has been great working with you all.

SOUTHERN REGION

In the absence of a Southern Coordinator, I have tried to keep Southern affiliates up to date with issues by providing reports following State Management Committee meetings and assisting with regional meetings.

An end of year meeting was held in November 2008, and meetings have been held at Albuera Street Primary in March, and at East Derwent Primary in April.

Throughout 2008 we held regular meetings with the Tasmania *Tomorrow* Project team. We are still working on a process to ensure campus based parent and community involvement, and hope that a way forward on this will emerge before the complete transfer of colleges to the new system. We are encouraged by the experience of our Northern Coordinator at Newstead College and the move from Elizabeth College to ensure that this issue does not slip through the cracks.

Concerns were raised evident last year on the replacement options for the Bridgewater High School and the recommendations from the Bridgewater and South Midlands Education Renewal Taskforce.

At our April meeting at East Derwent Primary, Andy Bennett gave an update on the Southern Midlands Learning Federation that will provide Child and Family Centres, 3 birth – grade 4 primary schools (Brighton to remain K – G6), a middle school (g5 -8) and a grade 9 – adult Learning Centre with a trade training centre attached.

The other big development for schools in the south has been the Glenorchy Project that emerged as a result of the Schools Futures Fund and the Building the Education Revolution initiatives.

The Glenorchy Project will see

- the closure of Roseneath, Mt Faulkner, Abbotsfield and Claremont Primary schools. They will be replaced by two new schools on green-fields sites.
- Brent Street and Glenorchy Primary schools merge onto the Glenorchy Primary site.
- Claremont and Rosetta High Schools merge onto the Rosetta site.
- A *Big Picture School* established in Glenorchy from the start of 2010.
- Springfield Gardens Primary consolidate its two campuses onto one site.

There were concerns at the beginning of the year with the loss of many contract school buses and the transfer of student transport to Metro services, the roll out of the new Electronic School Signs.

We are aware that we have not had a meeting in Term 2. Although Term 3 will be a very busy one for TASSP&F with the National Conference being held in Hobart in October, we will be aiming to hold meetings in September and November. Coordinating regional meetings will be greatly enhanced by the appointment of a Southern Coordinator from our elected Southern Delegates.

NOTE 1 STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

(a) Basis of Preparation:

The accounts have been drawn up in accordance with applicable Accounting Standards and disclosure requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act 1963.

The accounts have been prepared on the basis of historical costs and do not take into account changing money values. The accounting policies have been consistently applied.

The accounts have been maintained on an accrual basis and the Statement of Financial Position reflects moneys owed by and to The Council at the end of the accounting period.

(b) Changes in Accounting Policies:

(c) Property, Plant and Equipment:

Valuation:

Acquisition: Items of property, plant and equipment are recorded at cost and depreciated as recorded below.

Depreciation: Items of property, plant and equipment are depreciated over their useful lives. The reducing balance method is used. Assets are depreciated from the date of acquisition.

(d) Provisions:

Long Service Leave: The provision for long service leave represents all benefits accruing to employees from the date when employment commenced.

Annual Leave: Provision for annual leave represents all benefits accrued to employees as at 30th June 2009.

(e) Leased Assets:

Operating lease payments are charged as an expense in the period in which they are incurred. Photocopier Lease 60 months – August 2007 – 2012
